PROGRAM: HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Teresa Bianchi is the Director of Development for Flower City Habitat for Humanity. Last Fall she worked with Greece Rotarian Mike Sofia and Jack Best to undertake a Monroe County Rotary initiative with Habitat. In past years, Rotarians had actually constructed or put new roofs and siding on cabins at Camp Haccamo. That opportunity was lost when the Camp moved to the Rotary Sunshine Campus. So, the proposed replacement was to engage in a Habitat "Rotary Build." To help raise the \$75,000 needed to actually construct a house, Teresa engaged Monro Muffler to endorse a SKU donation (\$1, \$3, \$5) for its customers from June 12- September 22. Significant media exposure also promoted that Rotary/Habitat/Monro Muffler collaboration.

Teresa talked about the criteria surrounding a Habitat house, with most qualifiers being a family of four earning \$15,000-\$18,00 annually. Habitat's homeowners assume a 30 year mortgage, at zero percent, paid directly back to Habitat, with those proceeds going toward new "builds." They must provide 450 hours of hands-on work on a new house, with 250 hours working on other homes than their own. That work requirement also helps them to build community involvement and spirit since the houses are located near each other and create their own neighborhoods.

It takes approximately 77 days from ground-breaking to house completion. Taking the lead are the "hammer and saw" crew, made up of volunteer electricians, plumbers and carpenters. Plus Flower City Habitat has a pool of 4,000 volunteers who want to work on a house! Organizations and groups like Penfield Rotary who have donated at least \$1,000 enable their volunteers to go to the head of the line. Six volunteers a day work alongside the "hammer and saw" crew. So, over 77 days about 460 volunteers can be favored. Habitat neighborhoods not only improve life quality, but they enhance education outcomes. Habitat houses in Rochester graduate 98% of their residents from high school, compared to the prevailing 50% Rochester City School District rate.

Flower City Habitat collaborates with many organizations to raise funds or buildings. They have a "Women's Build" house, funded and constructed by women. College students are working together. Harley School is collaborating with Habitat to erect a hospice house. Heritage Christian Services is using Habitat's cabinet shop to make cabinets for its new home in the 12 Corners area. Rochester Rotary is enthusiastically supporting Habitat, with many of its members interesting in having their companies donate \$1,000 so that they can have six of their employees engage in team-building on a Habitat "build."

President Christian presented Teresa with a check for \$1,000. She remarked that Penfield is the first of the 12 Monroe County Rotary Clubs to make a \$1,000 donation and qualify for a team opportunity.
